<u>January 13</u> – "Google Earth for Genealogists" – Live webinar with Lisa Louise Cooke who has a blog and does podcasts from <a href="www.GenealogyGems.com">www.GenealogyGems.com</a> Photos, documents, videos, text, historic maps, graphic overlays and multimedia elements stored on a cloud can be added into Google Earth to create an exciting way to tell your family history stories.

<u>February 21</u> (Saturday Seminar)—Dick Eastman publisher of the free daily online genealogy newsletter <a href="http://blog.eogn.com">http://blog.eogn.com</a> will present three one-hour talks:

- 1. "Genealogy Searches on Google" Extracting the most genealogy information possible from everyone's favorite search engine.
- **2.** "Using Online Genealogy Programs"- instead of a program installed in your own computer.
- **3.** "The Organized Genealogist" A look at various methods of organizing record keeping by use of digital techniques. This talk focuses on converting paper-based record keeping to all digital records, making plenty of backups (to be stored in different locations), and preserving the digital records for many more years than is possible with paper. This also discusses methods of digitally preserving printed books and magazines for long-term storage and making sure that information in those publications can be easily searched and retrieved.

why, but I am glad that I didn't lose my files and especially my photos. The lesson to be learned from this is that automatic back-up to the cloud will not save files from a virus/malware. The best thing to do is manually backup files to a flash drive or external hard drive.

#### My Heritage Library Edition


My Heritage Library Edition is now free on the computers in the Family History Center. Searches may be made in its databases and family trees.

#### Biggest digitization of Irish Records to Begin <u>Dick Eastman</u> · <u>December 1, 2014</u>

The National Library of Ireland is to digitize more than 400,000 images of Catholic parish register microfilms and publish them online for free. In what is being described as the most significant ever digitization project for Irish genealogy, the microfilms will be available online for free from the National Library of Ireland (NLI) by the summer of 2015. The records are considered the single most important source of information on Irish family history prior to the 1901 Census. Dating from the 1740s to the 1880s,

they cover 1,091 parishes throughout the island of Ireland, and consist primarily of baptismal and marriage records. "This is the most ambitious digitization project in the history of the NLI, and our most significant ever genealogy project," said Colette O'Flaherty, head of special collections at the NLI. "We believe it will be of huge assistance to those who wish to research their family history. At this stage, we have converted the microfilm reels on which the registers are recorded into approximately 390,000 digital images. "We will be making all these images available, for free, on a dedicated website, which will be launched in summer 2015."

#### **Library Report**

He used DNA testing and the scant evidence that was available. It is an exciting story of his success and offers information about the many networks that can facilitate adoption searches. For adoptees and others uncertain of their parentage, this book can be an essential guidebook of tips and techniques. He was featured on the front page of the Wall Street Journal and is co-director of the Global Adoptee Genealogy Project.
- 2. **"Pioneers of Wiregrass Georgia,"** a biographical account of the early settlers of the counties of Irwin, Wayne, Camden and Glynn volumes 11 and 12 in the reference section of the Lakes region Library. R GEN 929.3758 HUX (Donated by the Sparkman family)
- 3. "Pioneers of the Wiregrass," a biographical account of some of the early settlers of the wiregrass areas of Georgia, Florida and Alabama two volumes in the reference section of the Lakes region Library. R GEN 929.375 PIO (Donated by the Sparkman family)
- 4. "Before They Were Heroes at King's Mountain" by Randall Jones. This book tells of the experiences of the Virginians, Carolinians, and the backcountry Georgians during the 6 years leading up to the Battle of Kings Mountain.
