However it also has city directories, early passport applications and some naturalization indexes and records. Peter will explore how to search as well as browse for ancestors' records, and what can be done with those records once they are located. Fold3 is free to use in the Family History Center. Members may add Memorial Pages to honor military heroes from their families by adding photos, documents and stories to the website.

Have you started to create your family tree in Family Tree Maker (FTM)? Have you added media items by scanning documents or by downloading them from the internet? Have you created source citations either by using the built-in templates or via the free-form method? Have you used the free resources available to find and download your family's record in the 1940 or earlier census?

Have you tried creating lists, which constantly need to be updated, to keep track of which birth, marriage, death, draft registration, etc. records you have found and which you still need to locate?

If you have done all these things, and want to learn how to fully utilize more of the power of FTM, this course is for you. Each of the various workspaces in FTM will be covered and demonstrated with the goal of enhancing your understanding of the program. How to use FTM in conjunction with the free Ancestry.com Family Tree service will be covered in a separate class.

It should be emphasized this is an advanced level course and should only be taken by those who already have a working familiarity with Family Tree Maker. These classes are lecture and demo only and not held in the computer lab.

# Build a Family Tree using Ancestry.com's free online Family Tree Building Feature

Did you ever want to start building your family tree, but didn't know where to start? This class will walk you through the basics, to get you started on building your family tree using Ancestry.com's free online **Ancestry Member Tree** family tree building service.

All you need to get started is Internet access, a personal computer, and a working knowledge of your personal computer.

The class will start by showing you how to:

- Get a free account at Ancestry.com which is required.
- Start building your Ancestry Member Tree online at Ancestry.com.
- Add relatives; parents, spouse's, children, siblings, grandparents, etc.
- Add birth, death, marriage, & burial dates & location facts to your family tree.
- Add fact information and images, found on free sites such as FamilySearch.org, Find A Grave, HeritageQuest, etc., to your family tree.

After finishing the basics, we will explore how you can upload an existing family tree to Ancestry Member Trees.

# November 10<sup>th</sup> - Pioneer Florida Descendant Award

At our November 10<sup>th</sup> meeting the Florida Pioneer Descendant Award will be presented by Amy Crabill Lay, Chairman of the Florida State Genealogical Society Pioneer Descendant Program, to Maryann McLeod, a resident of Citrus County. The Florida State Genealogical Society's Florida Pioneer Descendants Certification Program honors descendants of Florida pioneers who settled in the Territory of Florida prior to Florida achieving statehood on 3 March 1845. In order to qualify for a Florida Pioneer Descendant's Certificate, you will need to prove: Residency of the Pioneer Ancestor and Your Direct Line of Descent from the Pioneer Ancestor.

The application fee is \$45 for each application that can include multiple pioneers and multiple descendants that are in a direct family line of descent. This fee is due when the application is submitted. Once the application is approved, this fee includes one (1) certificate and one (1) Pioneer Descendant pin. Irish Parish Records – <a href="http://registers.nli.ie">http://registers.nli.ie</a> The National Library of Ireland in Dublin has placed the entire collection of Catholic parish register microfilms held by the National Library of Ireland (NLI) online. Involved are over 370,000 digital images of the microfilm reels on which the parish registers are recorded and which will be accessible free of charge. You must know the name of the county and the parish. This website has the original microfilm of the parish record of birth marriage and death. Names are not indexed. Remember Irish names were very common and it is not unusual to find persons with the same name in many different counties and parishes.

**Scottish Records –** <u>www.scottishindexes.com</u> Free birth, marriage, death, census records as well as prison and court records, Quaker records. Not all areas of Scotland are covered yet but will be added soon.

# Genealogy Magazines in the Lakes Region Library, Inverness

The **genealogy** society subscribes to three genealogy magazines and donates them to the Lakes Region Library in Inverness to make them available for your use. The *Internet Genealogy* magazine, *Your Genealogy Today* (formerly *Family Chronicle*) and *American Ancestors* magazines are located in file holders <u>at the reference desk</u>. The following are descriptions of interesting articles from recent magazines.

#### Internet Genealogy August/Sept 2015

"Seven Resources for World War II Reunion Groups and Associations," by Jennifer Holik, pp 11-15. This article discusses what military reunion groups have to offer families of the veteran. These groups may have preserved stories and veteran experiences, photos, maps, books, online discussion groups, unit histories, and reunion meetings. "National Folklore Collection of Ireland: Schools' Collections," by Joe Grandinetti, pp 29-33. In the late 1930s, the Irish Folklore Commission gave Ireland's school children a homework assignment. "They were tasked with collecting and documenting local stories from their parents, grandparents and older community members." "This assignment gave rise to a valuable transfer of cultural exchange between old and young." 740,000 pages were collected. These pages are being digitized and published online - free of charge at www.Duchas.ie in the "Schools' Collection." (Click on English at the bottom of the home page.) Not all counties are represented yet because it is an ongoing project. Some stories are in the Irish language. Examples of the stories are shown in the article.

#### **American Ancestors Summer 2015**

"Research Like a Pro – NEHGS Experts Share their Top Tips" by Rhonda R. McClure, pp 28-32. Expert genealogists give tips for successful research. Some of those suggestions include "research collateral lines" and "research beyond family." Learn about underutilized sources such as land records.

#### New Books in the Library

The following are the latest books given by the genealogy society to the Lakes Region Library. These books are located in the Genealogy Section of the Lakes Region Library on Druid St. in Inverness. You may request a book to be sent to the Library nearest you.

### How to Do Everything: Genealogy, Fourth Edition by George C. Morgan, GEN 929.1 MOR

Mr. Morgan is a renowned genealogy expert who has written numerous genealogy books and is a popular speaker at genealogical conferences. This book has been fully updated to show how to use both traditional and online genealogy research methods. It explains all the different genealogical record types, including traditional and digital research strategies. It defines the basic rules of genealogical evidence, explains how to evaluate source materials, and describes proven research methods. This book reveals how to:

- Organize and create your family tree
- Research census documents, military service records, and land and property rolls
- Locate difficult-to-find records
- Use the most efficient internet search techniques
- Plan a successful genealogy research trip
- Evaluate sources for authenticity
- Research and verify ancestors using genetic genealogy (DNA)
- Get past brick walls and dead ends in your research
- Use social networking sites and collaboration tech-

The book contains 490 pages and includes examples of the various records discussed.

The Family Tree Guidebook to Europe by Allison Dolan and the Editors of Family Tree Magazine, GEN 929.1 DOL, 269 pages

The book contains a chapter for each of the European countries or regions. Each chapter contains a map of the country or region discussed and a time line of major events in its history along with detailed information about migration patterns. In each chapter there is a resource section which provides contact information for records archives in the country or region, along with books and periodicals that can be referred to for

additional information and websites that can be searched. The last chapter of the book provides a history of the Jewish in Europe. The book is a great resource for individuals trying to research their European families.

#### Unofficial Guide to Ancestry.com by Nancy Hendrickson, GEN 929.1 HEN, 255 pages

This book explains the Ancestry.com website in detail. It begins by explaining membership and how to get started with Ancestry.com through how to establish your tree, navigate through the various tree options and how to add content to your tree. The book explains all of the various search options, how to use the card catalog, making the most of census records, birth, marriage and death records, military records, immigration records, and how to explore newspapers, publications and maps, search stories, memories and histories, explore historical pictures, schools, directories and church histories, and the tax, criminal, land and wills collections. It explains Ancestry DNA and how to collaborate with other people through Ancestry.com. Each chapter contains samples of the documents found on the Ancestry.com website. This is a great book for people who have not used the Ancestry.com website or those who want to make sure that they are getting the most out of their membership.

### How to Archive Family Photos: A Step-by-Step Guide to Organize and Share Your Photos Digitally by Denise May-Levenick, GEN 745.593 MAY, 240 pages

This book is organized in three parts. Part 1: Organize includes basic information for working with presentday digital photos and heirloom scanned images, including how to set up your computer, digital storage, and file management. Part 2: Digitize highlights the best practices for digitizing and preserving heirloom original photos and documents. Part 3: Create offers step-by-step instructions and project ideas to get you started using your digital images by creating unique photo gifts, family history books, calendars, and more. The book contains illustrations of items discussed.

This author hosts a blog as The Family Curator and has written a number of books with regard to organizing and storing family history paperwork and inherited items.

### MyHeritage Launches Breakthrough Global Name TranslationTM Tech

I think this is a huge advancement in online searches for genealogy information. I saw the brand-new Global Name Translation demonstrated earlier today at the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies (IAJGS) annual conference in Jerusalem and I am very impressed.

Global Name Translation is the easy way to search through MyHeritage's massive multilingual and international database of 6 billion family tree profiles and historical records. As stated in the announcement below, the Global Name Translation "...automatically translates names found in historical records and family trees from one language into another, in very high accuracy, generating all the plausible translations, to facilitate matches between names in different languages." In addition, a manual search in one language will also provide results in other languages, translated back to the user's language for convenience.

MyHeritage Yes, that's right. If your ancestors came from a country that keeps its records in a

language other than your preferred language, you can enter the search in your own language and MyHeritage will find matches for the same or very similar names in other languages as well. For instance, a search for Alexander or for Alessandro (Alexander in Italian) will also find "Cailia" which is the Russian form of Sasha, a popular nickname of Alexander in Russia.

The first version successfully translates names to and from English, German, Dutch, French, Spanish, Catalan, Portuguese, Italian, Norwegian, Swedish, Danish, Greek, Hebrew, Polish, Czech, Russian and Ukrainian. The next version currently in development will add Chinese and Japanese, and additional languages will follow.

# New on Ancestry.com

Ancestry now has information from the Social Security applications that people had to fill out to get a Social Security Card. This information has birth date, place, parent's names including mother's maiden name. There are no records for living people and the deceased must be older than 75 years in order to see the record. To view this information click on CARD

CATALOG from the drop down menu on the SEARCH tab at the top of the page. Under Key Words, type in Social Security Applications.

### New on FamilySearch.org

New York Land Records 1630 – 1975 are now free to view on <a href="https://familysearch.org">https://familysearch.org</a> These records are not indexed so must be viewed by browsing not by a search of names. Click SEARCH on the home page, then click on Browse All Published Collections. Scroll down to New York. Click on New York Land Records, then browse. Select county of interest. Next select time period of interest. You will be viewing the microfilm of the deeds. Click the arrow next to the word image to proceed page by page until you see an index of names with the corresponding page numbers. Go to the page of interest using the image arrow. (This is a very slow website.)

### Books on Familysearch.org

Books found on Google often can't be viewed or printed. Many of these books are on <a href="https://familysearch.org">https://familysearch.org</a> and can be read and printed. Click on SEARCH on the home page, then click on the word BOOKS at the top of the page. Type in the name of the book or a surname of interest to search for a surname book. There are 200,000 books online. Some books can only be viewed in a family history center.


