## Find-A-Grave has Changed

On 8 November 2017 <u>findagrave.com</u> changed. Some changes are cosmetic, while others are functional. A map feature has been added.

The home page has become a photograph with a few menu selections across the top. That page is dominated by the search panel, which functions largely as it did in the past and with the same options for every search box except those related to location.

The old search panel specified location via pull-down lists for country, state, and county. The new search panel offers a single box for location, in which you are supposed to type the name of a place. As you begin to type a city, county, state, or country that box auto-fills with suggested place names which you can select with a mouse click. Use the American English equivalent of a country name; *Germany* works but *Deutschland* doesn't.

The new home page's menu bar goes across the top of the screen. Clicking *CEMETERIES* takes you to a page that lets you hunt cemeteries in either of two ways:

- Near the top left of the page is a search box where you can type a cemetery name. This auto fill box works as above. When you select a name, you see a hit list of cemeteries with that name. Each entry on the hit list displays some facts about that cemetery, and a link to its information page. That page contains a search box that you can use to hunt for a person's name.
- Instead of using that cemetery-name search box, you can use the cemetery-place search box to its right. Clicking a place name produces a map of cemeteries near that place. You can zoom the map in or out, and can pan it in any direction. (If the map doesn't display any marker pins, zoom in.) After a name is in that search box, clicking *Search* leads to a hit list of cemeteries near that place. Use this hit list the same way you use the other cemetery search box.

#### International Vital Records Handbook

By Thomas Jay Kemp, GEN 929.1 KEM (756 pages)

A lot of the records that genealogy researchers use today have been computerized. However, there comes a time in your research when you may want or need to order an actual vital record from an office that may be far from your home. The International Vital Records Handbook can be a valuable resource when you are searching for a non-computerized record. This is the 7<sup>th</sup> Edition of this book and was released this year. You may find prior editions of this book in local libraries, but this volume should have more accurate, up-to-date contact information.

This book contains the latest application forms and ordering information for each of the fifty states in the United States with details about records that were created prior to statewide vital records registration; information on which records are restricted, and for how long; locations of vital records collections, online databases, and institutions of interest to genealogy researchers; and adoption search contact information and, where available, pre-adoption birth record and adoption search applications.

You can copy or scan the form you need at the library, follow the instructions, and send the fee and the completed form, with the identity documentation specified, to the appropriate record office. Each state section also provides phone numbers and email addresses and websites that you can refer to for further information with regard to each state.

This book also contains addresses of repositories or embassies that might help you obtain copies of vital records in countries where neither a centralized vital records registration system nor a vital records application form is available and, where available, for the other countries of the world. Included is information for the U.S. Trust Territories & Commonwealths of American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Panama Canal Zone, Puerto Rico, and St. Croix, St. Thomas and St. John in the Virgin Islands.

I also counted information for approximately 200 countries around the world from Afghanistan to Zimbabwe. Information for countries around the world also usually contains addresses, phone numbers and email addresses or web sites if additional information is needed. Where available, forms are included for some of the countries.

This book can be a valuable resource for genealogical researchers who want an easy way to find information about requesting non-computerized information in the United States and around the world.

## The Family Tree Italian Genealogy Guide By Melanie D Holtz, GEN (238 pages)

This book is divided into four parts. In Part One: Linking Your Family Tree to Italy, you will learn how to identify your Italian ancestors and how to trace your family line back to your ancestral town. Part Two: Getting to Know the Old Country helps you understand Italian history and geography. It also provides information on deciphering the Italian language, names and surnames. Part Three: Tracing Your Family in Italy explains the types of Italian records that are available. Examples are civil, church, census, taxation, wills, deeds, marriage contracts, military and more. Part Four: Advanced Sources and Strategies provides information with putting all of your research together and what to do when you encounter a brick wall.

The Appendix at the back of the book also contains a list of Publications and Websites that can aid in your research, a list of the Italian Provinces and Archives complete with mailing addresses and websites, Sample Letters to Request Records and Italian Genealogical Word Lists. The information provided in this book, along with the numerous maps and samples of documents makes this book a good resource for Italian genealogical research.

## Genetic Genealogy in Practice

By Blaine T. Bettinger and Debbie Parker Wayne, GEN (196 pages)

This is a workbook on genetic genealogy which provides family historians and genealogists who have just begun to explore genetic genealogy practical, easy to understand information that they can apply to their research.

DNA can seem complex, but this book will guide you and help build your knowledge level one step at a time. With this book you will be able to learn the basic home. www.nidirect.gov.uk/services/search-proniconcepts of genetic genealogy and then build on that knowledge as you study the testing, analysis, and application of YDNA, X-DNA, mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA), and autosomal DNA (atDNA) to reach and support genealogical conclusions. Each chapter includes exercises with answer keys for hands-on practice. The book contains numerous diagrams and charts explaining in detail the information being discussed.

Blaine Bettinger is an intellectual property attorney in Syracuse, New York. The author of The Genetic Genealogist blog, he is a genealogy educator, a trustee of the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society, and organizer of the Shared cM Project, a crowdsourced project examining the associations between genetic data and genealogical relationships.

Debbie Parker Wayne is a professional genealogist who has conducted research for individuals as well as for the PBS series "Finding Your Roots" with Henry Louis Gates Jr. and other television shows. She is an award-winning author, the coordinator for genetic genealogy institute courses, and the DNA Project Chair for the Texas State Genealogical Society.

Other databases at <a href="www.archive.org">www.archive.org</a> – Buffalo NY Death Index; New Jersey death index 1901 – 1903; New Jersey Birth Index 1901 – 1903; New York City Marriage Index. Type in the name of the database.

### 1895 New Jersey state census -

<u>www.familysearch.org</u> Many immigrants who arrived at Ellis Island often lived in New Jersey for a short time before moving on.

**Denmark** – FamilySearch.org has also put the 1930 Danish census online. There are some 3.6 million records in this collection. The records can be searched by first name and last name. Access is free.

# Registration Now Required for Family Search Website

Starting 13 December 2017, all users of the FamilySearch.org website will have to use a registered account to access the records on the website. Previously, users could access many of the functions of the website without having to log in. Registration is free and access to records is free. The change was prompted by some of FamilySearch's partners, who have insisted on authenticated accounts before providing data to FamilySearch.

If you tweet the Colorise Bot a photograph of a blackand-white photograph, Colorise Bot will transform it into a technicolor picture. The best part? It's super fast, with some images colorized in a matter of seconds.

The new tool is the product of two British teenagers, Oli Callaghan and Finnian Anderson. Oli is 18, while Finnian is just 17 years old. The Colorise Bot uses a pre-made neural network that'd been trained on a large dataset of 4.5 million images. twitter.com/colorisebot

Books in the Archive.org collection may be borrowed by logged-in patrons for a period of two weeks. Internet Archive offers borrowable books in BookReader, PDF and ePub formats. BookReader editions also may be read online immediately in any web browser.

How can you be sure which, if any, are your ancestors? Then there are name changes, usage of middle names, or even nicknames. Are these your ancestors? This presentation provides methods and tips to help determine if you are actually seeing your ancestor in the records you are researching.

A Dozen Resources You Should be Using but Probably Aren't - When we start researching a new ancestor, we tend to fall into our habitual pattern. We run through our usual resources. This presentation addresses resources that we all should use regularly, but which we probably don't. Some are sources, and some are sites where you can find multiple sources.




