At the October meeting I will be talking about Ancestry Academy on Ancestry.com. It is available only for subscribers and is not available at the Library or Church. Even subscribers may not know how to find it on Ancestry. At the top of the home page, click on the word **EXTRAS**. Then click on **Ancestry Academy**. There are 116 short course videos of a few minutes each on a variety of topics. Click on **Instructors** to see pictures of 44 nationally known instructors arranged alphabetically by first name. These instructors have videos classes of about an hour on a variety of topics.

The free genealogy website <https://familysearch.org> has a similar arrangement of classes by nationally known instructors. At the top of the home page, on the right in small print click on the words **GET HELP**. Then click on the words **LEARNING CENTER**. Type into the SEARCH box the name of a country, topic or name of an instructor and you will get a list of classes.

Eastman’s Online Newsletter

The Standard Edition of Dick Eastman’s Online Genealogy Newsletter is published weekdays and is free at www.blog.eogn.com There is a fee for the Plus Edition but it has additional information and no advertising. The following is an example of information found in the newsletter:

How to Find Genealogy, Family History, and Local History Books in the Internet Archive

Would you like to electronically search through 129,577 genealogy books? You can do that on the Internet Archives’ online service at:

<https://archive.org/details/genealogy>

Not only can you search these books, but you can do so electronically. A search for a name might require a few seconds, not hours or days in the manner of a manual search through printed books in a library.

The Internet Archive (also known as The Internet WayBack Machine Archive) is a San Francisco-based nonprofit digital library with the stated mission of “universal access to all knowledge.” It provides free public access to collections of digitized materials, including websites, software applications/games, music, movies/videos, moving images, and nearly three million public-domain books.

This online library now has a collection that fills more than 15 petabytes. **NOTE:** 15 petabytes is equal to 15 million gigabytes. The Internet Archive’s collection is growing daily. Best of all, the use of the Internet Archive is always **FREE**.

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Eastman's Online Newsletter

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The Internet Archive now has a dedicated section just for genealogy, family history, and local history books at <https://archive.org/details/genealogy>. You might want to go to that address first and then conduct a search there.

When writing this article, I went to <https://archive.org/details/genealogy>, found the box labeled "Search this Collection" and performed a search for: Eastman. That search found 37 books. Unlike searches I have performed in the past, all the books were either (1.) books about Eastman genealogy or (2.) genealogy or local history books that had the name Eastman someplace within the book. In fact, quite a few of the books were local histories for towns where Eastman families had settled. I also tried searching for geographic locations, such as "Penobscot County," and had equally good success.

The front covers of each book were displayed, and clicking on the image of any book cover immediately showed the contents of the book. Once I clicked on a book's image, full source citations also were displayed for that book.

The searches seem to work best for surnames of families that have been in North America for a century or longer. It does not work well for recent immigrants with eastern European or Oriental or Hispanic names. After all, these books are out of copyright; therefore, almost all were published prior to 1923.

New York Census of Inmates, Almshouses and Poorhouses, 1830 – 1920

This database from the New York archives is an important resource because when many immigrants arrived, part of the family may have come earlier and families were separated. As a result many immigrants may have stayed for awhile in almshouses or poorhouses.

This database may give place of birth, date of birth, parent's names and place of birth. To access this database go to Ancestry.com and click on **SEARCH** then on **CARD CATALOG**. Type into the line for title, "New York Census Inmates."

The **genealogy** society subscribes to three genealogy magazines and donates them to the Lakes Region Library in Inverness to make them available for your use. The *Internet Genealogy* magazine, *Your Genealogy Today* and *American Ancestors* magazines are located in file holders **at the reference desk.** If you can't find them, just ask one of the librarians. The following are descriptions of interesting articles from recent magazines.

Internet Genealogy Aug/Sept 2017

“Demystifying the Freemasons” by Melody Amsel-Arieli. This article describes the organization of Freemasons and provides a list of websites for Freemason research and genealogical sources. Pp.45-49.

“Through the Night Gates: Portals to the Past” by Sue Lisk. She looks at six ways to research your family history and avoid paying subscription fees.

Your Genealogy Today Sept/Oct 2017

“Road Overseers, Surveyors of Highways, and Road Juries” by David A. Norris. He looks at how early road-building records might pave the way to new genealogical information. “From colonial times and well into the 19th century, residents of many areas were compelled to contribute a few days’ labor each year to build public roads and bridges. Temporarily appointed officials known by such titles as road overseer, road-commissioner, or surveyor managed construction and maintenance projects.” ...”the records of these early road-building efforts created a large body of genealogical material.” He describes where road records may be found. Pp 24-26.

American Ancestors Summer 2017

“Founder, Forge, and Feuds” “Roger Tyler and Early New England Ironworks” by Alicia Tyler and Marie Tyler-McGraw. “Roger Tyler is the founder of the ‘Branford Line’ of Tylers in America which extends to at least 12 generations of descendants. Tyler was also an ‘iron founder.’ This article describes the ancestry of Roger Tyler. Pp 32-37.

Genealogy Offline: A beginner's guide to family history records that are not online

By Claudia C. Breland, GEN 929.1 BRE (124 pages)

Experienced genealogists know that the vast majority of valuable family history records are NOT online, but are housed in libraries, archives, historical societies and courthouses across the nation. After you've found names and dates and some basic information on the internet, where do you go for details? How can you find out how your ancestors lived? In this book the

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author will walk you through the basics of obtaining records such as:

- Social Security Applications,
- Land and Property Records,
- Wills and Probate Records,
- Vital Records,
- Court Records,
- Military Records,
- Divorce Records,
- Adoption and Guardianship Records,
- Newspapers, and
- Naturalization Records.

Each chapter describes the type of record, the information contained, where to find them, and examples of the record.

The Family Tree Irish Genealogy Guide: How to Trace Your Ancestors in Ireland

By Claire Santry, GEN (239 pages)

This in-depth guide will take you step-by-step through the exciting and challenging journey of discovering your Irish roots.

The book is divided into three parts.

- Part 1: Linking Your Family Tree to Ireland,
- Part 2: Getting to Know the Old Country, and
- Part 3: Using Advanced Sources and Strategies.

With the information in these chapters, you will learn how to identify immigrant ancestor, find your family's county and townland of origin, and locate key genealogical resources that will breathe life into your family tree. With historical timelines, sample records, resource lists, and detailed information about where and how to find your ancestors online, this guide has everything you need to uncover your Irish heritage.

The book provides the best online resources for Irish genealogy; detailed guidance for finding records in the old country, from both the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland; helpful background on Irish history, geography, administrative divisions, and naming patterns; and case studies that apply concepts and strategies to real-life research problems. Whether your an-

cestors hail from the bustling streets of Dublin or a small town in County Cork, this book will give you the tools you need to track down your ancestors in Ireland.

Family Search Updates

Digitized Microfilm — Microfilmed records can no longer be ordered from the Mormon Library in Salt Lake City. Much of this microfilm has been digitized and is available for free online at the free website <https://familysearch.org>

You may need to register and create a user name and password to view some of the films. Microfilm from foreign countries may only be viewed on the computers in the Family History Center.

To find digitized microfilm, search the Catalog by name of the Place. After film ordering ends, if customers need access to a particular film yet to be digitized, they can express interest to have it added to the priority digitization list by contacting [FamilySearch Support](#) (Toll Free: 1-866-406-1830).

- All of the microfilm rented by patrons in the past 5 years have now been digitized by FamilySearch—over 1.5 million microfilms (ca. 1.5 billion images).
- The remaining microfilms are being digitally scanned at a rate of 1,000 films per day and are projected to be complete by 2020.

New digital images are available as they are scanned in the [FamilySearch.org Catalog](#).

Deed Records — These records have been an underutilized source because they required a trip to a courthouse. Now these records are available on microfilm online. To find them, go to **Search, Catalog**, then type in name of state and county and search. A list of types of records will appear. Click on **Land Records** to get a list of records. Choose the one from the court house. There are usually indexes so that you can search by name to find the book and page number for the deed.

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Family Search Updates

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Pennsylvania Deed Indexes — These indexes are a bit tricky to use. Search the index by the first letter of the last name and then the first letter of the first name. You will get the book and page number of the actual handwritten deed. Other states may use this indexing method as well. Common surnames may have a section in the index by themselves.

- Free access to Ancestry.com, FindMyPast, MyHeritage and other subscription databases.
- Printing – 10 cents/page.


